What we've been doing this term...

Sharing learning

One of our big aims for the year has been to develop home-school links, giving parents and carers more opportunities to come into school and find out more about what we're learning - and this term has been packed with events designed to do this. We've had maths and reading workshops spread across almost every year group, regular Stay

and Play events in Early Years, parent sessions at the end of Year 3/4's Egypt Day and Year 5/6's Circus Day - and, in the final week of term, a fantastic Science Fair, which saw around 150 children, parents and carers taking part in a series of science activities for an hour after school.



Easter Egg Competition

We held our annual Easter Egg Competition in the final week of term. With some fantastic ideas, designs (and pun-tastic names), it was a great display of artistic flair and ingenious constructions - including models of Wembley Stadium, WW2 bombers

with egg pilots, stables, company meetings and fish tanks, along with gorgeous Easter bonnets and lots of carefully painted egg characters. It was great to see how much we all enjoyed looking at the creations and picking out our favourite details - even if all the care and attention did make some of the judging decisions trickier than ever!

School Council

School council have been busy, organising the sponsored Dance-a-thon which raised an impressive £1196! We have also been lucky enough to secure a donation of £500 from the Follett Trust. This means that our Trim Trail total is now standing at just over £3,000. Our Easter disco takings will also go into the pot, and we are thinking hard about what we could do next to raise more money. If you have any suggestions, please let us know.

Our Year 6 councillors also took part in the Stevenage Schools Parliament. Reggie, Alfie, Aaliyah and Aleena represented Bedwell School and spoke in the chamber to discuss different projects to benefit the Stevenage community. It was decided to hold a bake sale in support of a Stevenage homeless charity, which will take place in the summer term.

Science Week

We rounded-off the term with a fantastic Science Week. The final week of term saw us taking part in a variety of challenges, workshops and activities, including:

- Our annual Egg Drop Challenge, building a contraption that could safely transport an egg from the top of the Infant hall to the floor below.
- Workshops with *Teaching Talons*, who brought a collection of animals into school, including guinea pigs, an owl, cockroaches, tortoises and a very friendly dog.
- The K'nex Challenge, where we worked in pairs to build a bridge that allowed a boat to go underneath and a car to go over the top.
- Lots of science activities in class, including bug hunts, kite making, construction challenges and research projects.

As you can probably tell, it was a really busy week, packed with fab opportunities to learn about science and what it means to be a scientist.























World Book Day

To celebrate World Book Day, we got into costume, dressing-up as our favourite storybook characters. We were really impressed with the range of characters and stories on show, with everything from Elmer the Elephant and Fantastic Mr Fox to the Demon Dentist and the Balaclava Boys! We also had an army of Harry Potters (as well as lots of Rons and Hermiones), a palace of Disney princesses and enough superheroes to take on even the most fearsome of villains!

During the week, we also took part in lots of reading events throughout the school, including Buddy Reading with children in younger years, taking part in online workshops and writing lots of reviews and recommendations. Dormice and Fieldmice also organised a fantastic Come and Read session to share ideas with parents and carers. Finally, we did lots of work linked to this year's special World Book Day £1 books, reading extracts, making predictions and learning more about their authors.

Talk for writing:

We got very excited when we watched a video of our baked **Gingerbread Men** running away from our classrooms! After this we created Wanted posters and looked for clues. We also innovated the story and changed the character to 'Pizza man' and we were also visited by a wolf. We have also learnt the story Jaspers Beanstalk, planting our own broad beans, keeping a bean diary and learning what seeds need to grow.

<u>Theatre trip:</u>

We visited the theatre to watch The Tales of Acorn Wood. We loved getting on the coach and sitting in our special theatre chairs. The story was told by such amazing story tellers using fantastic props. When we returned, we acted out the story and told our own versions.

Phonics:

In Ladybird class we have been learning a new sound each day as part of our phonics scheme. In Butterfly Class, meanwhile, we have been working very hard to record our own sentences, and are now trying to do this independently.



























Fieldmice & Dormice

In maths we have been learning the language of length, height and mass, using this vocabulary in practical activities. We also developed our understanding of number bonds to 20, using Cuisenaire rods to help us to see how different numbers combine to make the same total.

In science we have been looking closely at materials and their properties, using language like absorbent, magnetic, waterproof and durable. Our work on fairy tales saw us searching for the best material to solve their problems, such as finding the right material to build a house for the Three Little Pigs. Our fairy tale theme weaved its way into our DT work as well, as we designed and created a hand puppet of our favourite character, learning how to cut materials, thread a needle, sew and glue.

Finally, we finished last half-term with a fairy tale day! We came dressed as our favourite characters, completed a circuit session and made jam tarts which we all thoroughly enjoyed.

English : Dear Mr Wolf...

Fairy tales and persuasive writing

In English this term we began by learning the story of Little Red Riding Hood. We explored a variety of fairy-tales, looking at the types of characters we found (with lots of heroes, princesses, talking animals and evil wolves and witches). We thought about the types of places where these stories took place, and eventually created new fairy-tales of our own.

We then moved on to explore persuasive letters. We used a letter to the Big Bad Wolf as our starting point, looking at the ways in which our model letter tried to persuade him to be a bit less Big and Bad (and a bit more kind and helpful!) We then used these skills to write our own persuasive letters. We wrote to the Easter Bunny (asking for eggs) and then to any character we chose - everything from asking Godzilla to be a bit less scary, to asking Harry Kane to play football with us! Throughout all of this, our main focus has been writing in sentences, adjectives and letter structure.

Year 2: Hedgehogs




































Year 3: Rabbits

King Tut's Tomb Raided!



English : Explanations

We began the term by exploring explanation writing. We looked at lots of examples of explanations of complex, ingenious inventions and identified the way that these texts are structured and linked together. We focussed in particular on a model text which explained how the SHIELD Helicarrier works, and then used this to inspire our writing. We invented vehicles for some of our favourite characters and explained how they worked - just like Holly has done here:



<u>Viking Britain</u>

In the second half of the term, we've been learning all about Vikings. We investigated their history, from early raids to full invasions, battles with Alfred the Great and the partition of England. Year 5/6: Eagles

He wowed the whole school with his tricks and jokes, before focussing on teaching Eagles and Falcons a host of circus skills. We all attended two workshops, learning how to walk on stilts, spin plates, spin toothbrushes and finally juggle. At the end of the day, we invited parents and carers to come and see us perform our new found talents!

Linked to our work in English, we also created 'circus art' using simple techniques to create a stunning effect.

Evolution

In science we have learned all about evolution and how different animals have adapted to their environments. Horses, elephants, humans you name it - we've looked at how small changes over millions of years has enabled different species to survive. We have also found out about Charles Darwin and the impact his discoveries have had on our lives today.

English : Setting Description
