What we've been doing this term...














Easter Disco

This term our topic has been Up, Up and Away! We have been learning about flight and how it has changed throughout the years from gliders to the planes of today.


English

Forest School

We have learnt the difference between past and present tense and created our own stories, writing about something we would like to be.


























Year 2: Hedgehogs

<u>History</u>

This term we have been learning about the history of 'heavier than air' flights, from the man-lifting kites of Ancient China and the balloon flights of the Montgolfier brothers, through to the first aeroplanes of the Wright brothers, and the supersonic flights of Concorde. Along the way, we also learnt about many famous pilots including Louis Bleriot and Amy Johnson.

<u>Maths</u>

We have learned to tell the time (using TOothPASTe!), multiply using arrays, use formal addition (arranging numbers vertically and carrying tens where necessary), and formal subtraction by breaking up a ten when we needed into ten ones. We have also developed methods to help us add and take away in our heads.

Science Week

We loved throwing ourselves into this year's Science Week, building egg-drop contraptions, taking part in our sensory trail and learning about space in a giant planetarium!













Year 3: Rabbits

Science Week

We thoroughly enjoyed getting involved in this year's Science Week. A particular highlight was our session with the visiting planetarium, where we learnt about the solar system, stars and planets in a huge inflatable dome. We also had great fun completing this year's Knex challenge, where we had to build a protective helmet. and our annual Egg Drop competition, where we worked in pairs to build a contraption capable of safely transporting an egg from the classroom roof to the ground below.

Ancient Egypt

Our topic this term has been the Ancient Egyptians, and we have loved learning about their world especially the messy facts about how they made their mummies! We have also explored their Gods, clothes, food and lifestyle, and have begun to investigate the way that they used hieroglyphics. To support our learning we also took part in a brilliant trip to Milton Keynes Theatre to watch a Horrible Histories show.




English : Leon and the Place Between

English : Biographies

We explored the lives of some great female scientists, including Marie Curie, Katherine Johnson and Mary Anning, and were then inspired to write the biographies of other great women from history. You can read two great examples of our work below:

<u>Rosa Parks</u>

Rosa Parks was one of the first black women to challenge segregation in the USA. She lived at a time when various laws meant that black people were treated worse than white people, so how did her actions make a lasting change? Read on to find out more!

Rosa Parks, who was born on 4th February 1913, grew up in Montgomery, Alabama. The society that she lived in was very racist and she wanted this to change. This was difficult as she was a black woman and did not have many rights.

After several years, she started getting involved in the civil rights movement (trying to stop racism). On December 1st 1955 she refused to give up her seat in the white section of the bus. At that time, black people had to sit in the back of the bus (or stand up) if a white person wanted their seat, and she felt this was unfair. As a result, she was arrested, taken to prison and put on trial.

Following this, black people all over the city refused to use the buses until the law got changed. For over a year, they walked to work or got lifts, until finally there was a change. This was the first step in ending segregation across the USA. Rosa Parks was rewarded with the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1996. She died in October 2005.

<u>Frida Kahlo</u>

Frida Kahlo was famous for her awesome art. She painted over 200 pictures, some of which are now worth millions of pounds. She nearly died in a terrible accident, so how was she able to follow her dreams?

Frida Kahlo, who was born on July 6th 1907, grew up in Coyoacán in Mexico. She learned to be a doctor but got injured in a terrible bus crash. She went into hospital for a long time and couldn't be a doctor.

While Frida Kahlo was in hospital, she started painting. It made her feel better so she kept painting when she got out of hospital. When she was painting, Frida didn't try to make herself look pretty. She painted herself with big, bushy eyebrows!

Later in life she started selling her pictures and her paintings became very valuable. She was often ill and her life was difficult. Eventually, Frida Kahlo died in 1954. Over 70 years later, she is still remembered for her distinctive art.

<u>Maths</u>

Across all of our maths sets, a big focus this term was on measures. We completed lots of practical challenges to develop the ability to read scales precisely and measure mass, capacity and length. This also helped us to build an understanding of what 1kg or 1 litre 'looks like', so we can make sensible estimates and spot when answers just can't be right. Those of us in Year 6 have also taken part in weekly Booster sessions, building our understanding and confidence, ready for our SATs in May.















<u>English</u>

In English, we have covered Talking History, Effective Dialogue and Fairytales with a Twist. This has included focusing on using just the right language choices to create different tones – making sure that our speeches were persuasive, our dialogue was giving characterisation and moving the story forward, and that our fairytales used archaic language. It has been an incredibly busy term of sport, with teams out representing Bedwell in competitions and festivals almost every week, covering everything from badminton to handball to Quidditch! One of the biggest highlights was the performance of our Year 3/4 Athletics



team, who won both the Girls and Boys tournaments, beating ten other teams to come back with a set of gold medals. Our Year 3/4 Rapid Fire cricket team (who you can see above), also returned with a set of medals to show-off, this time silvers after narrowly losing a closely contested final. We completed the medal set with double bronzes for our Inclusive Team (drawn from across Years 3-6), who finished third in both the Trigolf and Rapid Fire Cricket events.

<u>Football</u>

All four of our school teams have played regularly this term, with 60 children now having had the opportunity to play for the school over the course of the year. Our Year 5/6 Girls team have reached the semi-finals of the Stevenage Cup after a convincing win over Knebworth in the final week of term (a game that included Hilda's third hattrick in three games), while our Year 5/6 'A' team are up to third in their division after a wellearned draw against a strong Codicote side. Our 'B' team, meanwhile, have made great progress this term, particularly in defence where they have shown fantastic resilience when taking on very strong opposition. Our Year 3/4 team has also been in regular action over the last few weeks - but the highlight of the term was actually the Stevenage Year 3/4 Girls Festival, which we organised and hosted. 17 of our girls joined 50 children from 6 other schools for an afternoon of friendly matches, coaching sessions and a penalties competition, and it was great to see so many children enjoying their first ever taste of organised football - and even better to see many of them seeking out more opportunities to play in the weeks since.

They both got off to a flying start with some relatively comfortable wins - but as the term has progressed, the matches have become harder, really testing the resolve and determination of our squads. As a result, both teams have made really strong starts to their seasons, and both are in contention at the top of their leagues as we move into the business end of the season.
