


Y3&4: Tring NHM

On Thursday 5th June, Years 3 and 4 headed to the Natural History Museum in Tring on what turned out to be a very rainy day. After we got settled, we spent the morning exploring the many galleries and exhibits before heading into a workshop on animal classification (which has been our science topic this term). We broke into groups and were given five different skeletons to investigate and identify. We loved exploring the museum, and many of us couldn't believe how big some of the animals are in real life!

Y5: Kew Gardens

In Year 5, we have been learning about rainforests this term - so, as we couldn't go on a trip to a real-life rainforest, we went for the next best thing and spent a great day exploring the tropical glasshouses at Kew Gardens. Inside, we really got a sense of just how hot and humid these environments can be, and were amazed by the massive tropical plants that we saw.























Bikeability

Everyone in Year 5 and 6 thoroughly enjoyed taking part in the Bikeability project, which took place in May. Led by instructors from the HCC Cycling team, we all completed Level 1 training, learning to ride safely and control our bikes on the playground. The vast majority of us then progressed onto Level 2, which saw us heading out and about on local roads.

As the week went on, each group went on longer and more complex rides, exploring local roads, learning to recognise potential dangers and getting used to riding on roads with other traffic. By the end of the week, 82 children had completed the course, and we were all presented with certificates and badges as a reward for our hard work.

Thanks to lots of hard work by Mrs Thomas and Mr Butler, along with some amazing donations from the community, we were able to send everyone who didn't have a bicycle of their own home with a roadworthy bike, along with a helmet, so that we can practice our new skills safely around town.





















Y6's PGL Adventure

On 13th June, a group of 32 intrepid Year 6s set-off on this year's PGL expedition. We spent 3 days at the adventure sports centre at Marchant's Hill, trying out a huge range of activities that we would never be able to experience at home.

Over the weekend, we took part in climbing, abseiling, zip wire, buggy building, archery and a tunnel trail - and it was great to so many of us taking on challenges and overcoming fears to make the most of every session. We also discovered lots of hidden talents and abilities that we would love to be able to explore further, with some of us showing expert marksmanship with an archery bow, while others showed amazing climbing skills on Jacob's Ladder.

The other big aim for the weekend was to spend a few nights away from home, without any contact with mums, dads and carers. This was tricky (and a first for many of us), but again it was great to see how we both grew in independence and supported each other while we were away.

































Fieldmice & Dormice Mache Masks

In Year 1 and 2 this term, we have been learning all about animals and their habitats. We have investigated the differences between animals with fur, scales and feathers, and linked this to the creatures we saw on our trip to Whipsnade. We have also investigated places where animals live and linked this to the food that they eat and the ways in which they move.

Having developed all of this knowledge, we then put it to good use on our latest art project, making paper mâché animal masks. We built up the basic structure of our masks by adding lots of layers of newspaper and glue, and then built up ears, beaks, noses and snouts that matched the shape of the creature we had chosen. Finally, we painted the masks to match the colouring of our animal, working carefully to include the spots, stripes and markings that make each of them unique. We were super proud of our finished masks, and loved showing them off in class!


















Personal Projects

English

In Year 5, meanwhile, we returned to report writing for our final writing unit of the year. Building on all of work we have done in science and geography on animal species and habitats, we produced an 'A-Z of animals', with each of us choosing one animal (and one letter) to write about. As you can see on the opposite page, we packed our writing with facts and detail, and then used bullet points, subheadings, quotes and captions to help the reader to navigate our texts.

S Snakes

"Snakes are incredible creatures, which can be highly dangerous."

Snakes are famous for their venomous bite. There are a huge variety of snakes, such as cobras, pythons and grass snakes, and these are found in warm places around the world (including Africa America and Europe). Snakes are reptiles and have scaly skin. They do not have legs, and move by slithering along the floor. Despite this, some snakes can be very dangerous.

Habitats

Snakes live in lots of different places. Some live in deserts and hide under rocks to stop them from getting too warm. Other snakes live in rainforests and slide between leaves, hunting for prey. Another group of snakes live in grasslands, and hide beneath the grass, waiting to strike.

Diet

Snakes are carnivores. Their diet usually includes:

- eggs
- capybarasantelope
- · anne
- small birds
- other snakes

Some snakes kill their prey with their poisonous fangs, but others (like boa constrictors) suffocate them by wrapping their coils around their victims until they cannot breathe.

Appearance

Snakes can be very small like the adder or very long like the cobra. Their colours vary and most have distinctive pattens on their body. They are covered in scales, which keep them dry and help to protect them from insect bites. They have large eyes and many have fangs at the front of their mouths. Rattlesnakes have a special part on their tail which they use to make a scary sound.

Hearing

Snakes do not have ears, but they have special bones on the inside of their heads that they can use to detect vibrations on the ground. This means that are very good at hearing low frequency sounds (like rumbles and roars). They are less good at hearing higher pitched sounds, but they are able to hear human voices.

Something surprising

There are 3000 different types of snakes! The smallest is the Barbados Threadsnake, which is just 10cm long, while the largest is the Green Anaconda, which can grow to almost 9m in length! There is even a flying snake in Southeast Asia, which can glide for 100m through the air!

Wolves

"These creates might seem dangerous, but they are actually really friendly!" JANE GOODALL

Wolves are famous for being incredible hunting animals. They live in large family groups a wide range of environments, from the frozen Arctic to the deserts of Saudi Arabia. They are intelligent, social creatures which hunt in packs and are able to bring down animals which are much larger than them. There are currently around 300,000 wolves living in the wild.

Appearance

Wolves are large and very furry. They are closely related to dogs, and share many of the same features. They can be grey, black, white and light brown. They also have sharp claws and triangular teeth like sharks.

<u>Diet</u>

Wolves are carnivores, and they eat many different foods, including moles, deer, rabbits, rodents and ungulates. They have also been known to eat larger mammals such as moose, beavers and even bison!

<u>Habitat</u>

There are more than 25 different types of wolves, which live in many

countries around the world, including Europe, China, Turkey and Saudi Arabia. Asian wolves are also found in Northern India, Pakistan and Afghanistan. They will make dens to protect new-born cubs, but after that tend to sleep in the open.

Types of wolves

Wolves all belong to the species Canis Lupus, but there are several different sub-species, including:

- Red wolf
- Steppe wolf
- Arctic wolf
- Indian wolf
- Indian wolf
 Tundra wolf
- Himalayan wolf
- Mongolian wolf

Something surprising

Wolves are very good at smelling things, and can smell you even when you are hiding! Wolves noses contain 200 million olfactory cells, which means that they can smell things up to 1.5 miles away. This helps them to find food in harsh environments (like deserts and the Arctic).
